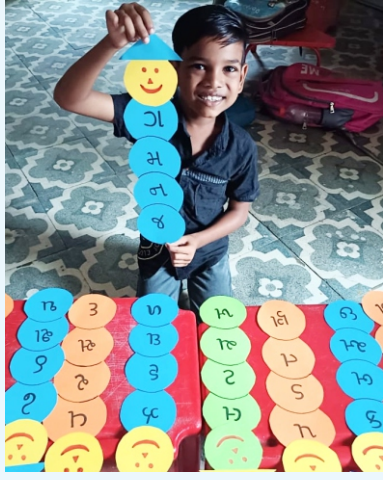

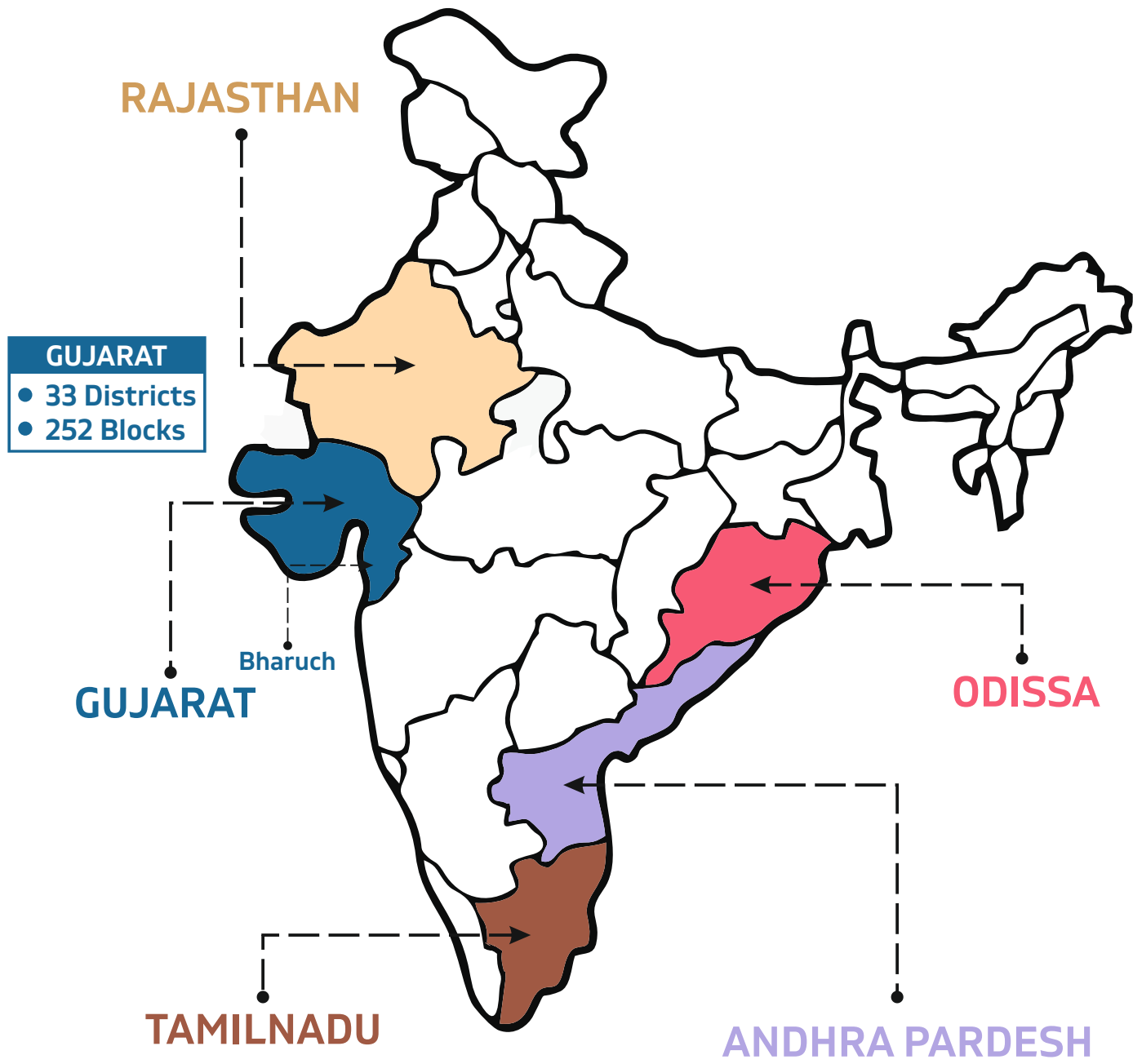

EDUCATION





VIDHYASAATHI

Our FLN (Foundational Literacy & Numeracy) initiative has positively impacted over 10,000 students across 02 blocks of Bharuch district. By strengthening basic reading, writing, and math skills, we are equipping students with the foundational tools essential for academic success and lifelong learning.

SALT PAN

Through the Salt Pan Education initiative, we provide informal education to 250 children from migrant families across 03 salt pan areas. This program ensures that despite seasonal migration for work, these children can continue their education uninterrupted, addressing the unique challenges of displacement.



EDUCATION & COMMUNITY PROGRAMME

Our efforts in 02 schools of Dabhoi Block, working with 200 students and 135 parents, have successfully boosted regular attendance and strengthened parental engagement. Through targeted strategies promoting consistent attendance and active involvement of parents, we have enhanced the overall learning environment, contributing to improved education outcomes.

GIRL CHILD HIGHER EDUCATION PROGRAM

To support girls in pursuing higher education, we provided bicycles to 500 girls across Bharuch district. This initiative ensures that girls from remote villages have a reliable and safe mode of transportation, enabling them to continue their studies at nearby educational institutions without the barrier of distance.



SCHOLARSHIP

To remove financial barriers to academic success, we provided financial aid to 50 meritorious students, enabling them to pursue higher education. This support has been crucial in helping talented students from underprivileged backgrounds continue their studies and achieve their full potential.



HEALTH & HYGIENE





ASANI UNIT

The ASANI sanitary napkins manufacturing unit stands out as a pioneering initiative in the tribal districts of Bharuch and Narmada, fully managed by women. Through intensive capacity building and training, women with limited formal education have come together to form a successful entrepreneurial group of 11 members. This cooperative not only addresses social and family issues but also takes concrete steps toward financial accessibility and ownership. These women are gaining significant empowerment and transforming their economic landscape.

MENSTRUAL HYGIENE MANAGEMENT

To ensure the Right to Health, with a focus on women's reproductive health, we conducted over 1,000+ Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM) sessions. These sessions, benefiting more than 26,000+ individuals, aimed to foster socio-behavioral changes in knowledge, attitudes, and practices related to menstruation across the broader population.



HEALTH CAMP

As part of our commitment to enhancing women's health in rural and tribal areas, we successfully conducted a Gynaecological Health Camp, benefiting around 500 women from five villages. This initiative focused on raising awareness about reproductive health and providing essential healthcare services, especially for adolescents.

MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS SESSION

In collaboration with the Aditya Birla Education Trust, we organized a series of general mental health awareness sessions across Bharuch district. These sessions aimed to promote mental well-being, reduce stigma, and equip students with essential coping skills. Through this initiative, we successfully reached over 10,000 students, providing them with valuable insights into managing stress, recognizing emotional challenges, and seeking support when needed. This program has contributed significantly to creating a supportive and open environment for mental health discussions among young learners in the region.

HEALTH & NUTRITION

Our health & nutrition program has been successfully implemented across 20 villages and 30 Anganwadi centers in Ankleshwar block, enhancing the nutritional well-being of local communities. This initiative benefits 2,500 children, 1,200 pregnant and lactating women, and 500 adolescents, focusing on improving key nutritional parameters.

DOUBLE FORTIFIED SALT PROGRAMME

As an implementing partner in Gujarat, we collaborate with Anganwadis, Fair Price Shops (FPS), and warehouses to enhance service delivery. Our efforts ensure that essential resources reach communities efficiently, driving positive change at the grassroots level.



UNIVERSAL SALT IODIZATION PROGRAMME

As an implementing partner for the Universal Salt Iodization (USI) program in Gujarat, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Odisha, and Andhra Pradesh, we collaborate with salt processors and industries to enhance iodization levels. This initiative ensures communities have access to iodized salt, significantly improving health outcomes and reducing iodine deficiency disorders.



FOOD KIT DISTRIBUTION

Each year, we combat malnutrition by providing nutritional kits to children identified as Severely Acute Malnourished (SAM) and Moderately Acute Malnourished (MAM) across Bharuch district. These kits are designed to enhance the nutritional status of the most vulnerable children, ensuring they receive essential nutrients for healthy development.

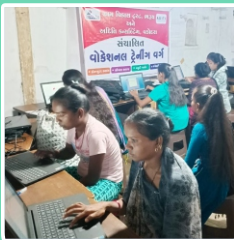


SEWING TRAINING

We have successfully implemented a Sewing Skill Training Programme aimed at youth and adolescents from rural, tribal, and underprivileged sections of society in Bharuch & Vadodara district. This initiative has benefited over 250 individuals, through 12 batches providing them with valuable skills that enhance their employability and foster self-sufficiency

BEAUTICIAN TRAINING

We implemented a Beautician Skill Training Programme for youth and adolescents from rural, tribal, and underprivileged communities in Bharuch & Vadodara district. This initiative has positively impacted over 200 beneficiaries through 10 batches by equipping them with essential skills for careers in the beauty industry.



COMPUTER TRAINING

We successfully implemented a Computer Skill Training Programme for youth and adolescents from rural and tribal areas in Bharuch & Vadodara district. This initiative equips participants with essential digital skills, bridging the technology gap and enhancing employability in today's digital economy, benefiting 50 individuals.

JEWELLERY MAKING

We successfully implemented a Jewellery Making Workshop Programme for youth and adolescents from rural, tribal, and underprivileged communities in Bharuch & Vadodara districts. This initiative has equipped 100 individuals with valuable skills in jewellery design and production.



SUCCESS STORY



RUPAL'S JOURNEY: OVERCOMING ANEMIA

Rupal, a vibrant 19-year-old girl from Old Haripura village in Ankleshwar Taluka, dreams of becoming a skilled seamstress. However, her aspirations are challenged by severe anemia, which she and her traditional tribal family are unaware of. Her father, Sureshbhai, is a hardworking farmer, while her mother, Jashoda Ben, runs a small home shop. Rupal also supports her younger sister, Pooja, who is focused on her 11th-grade studies.

HEALTH STATUS

Rupal's life took a critical turn when a project outreach worker noticed her occasional dizziness and pale appearance. A hemoglobin (HB) test revealed her level to be alarmingly low at 7%, categorizing her as severely anemic. Unaware of the condition's implications, Rupal and her family lacked knowledge about the importance of maintaining healthy HB levels during adolescence.

CHALLENGES

- **Limited Healthcare Access:** Their income depended solely on Sureshbhai's farming and Jashoda Ben's shop, restricting access to healthcare and nutritious food.
- **Nutritional Deficiencies:** A lack of awareness about dietary adjustments contributed to Rupal's anemia.
- **Knowledge Gap:** The family's ignorance about anemia hindered timely intervention.

PROJECT INTERVENTION

Recognizing the urgency of Rupal's situation, the project team provided essential support:

Education: They explained the importance of HB in oxygen transport and the risks associated with low levels, such as fatigue and hindered learning.

Dietary Guidance: Rupal received Take Home Ration (THR) packets and iron-folic acid (IFA) tablets, with ongoing education on their proper usage.

Nutritional Support: A "Poshan kit" containing iron-rich foods was provided, furthering her dietary improvement.

Continued Monitoring: Regular follow-ups were conducted to track Rupal's progress and provide additional assistance.

IMPROVEMENTS

Rupal's determination, combined with the project's support, led to significant progress. After consistent treatment, her HB level increased to 9.9%, transitioning her from the severe to moderate category. This improvement brought tangible benefits:

Increased Energy: Rupal felt revitalized, engaging actively in daily activities.

Enhanced Focus: Her concentration in school and sewing classes improved markedly.

Overall Well-being: With better health, Rupal regained confidence in pursuing her dreams.



Rupal's story illustrates the transformative power of knowledge, community intervention, and individual determination. By empowering her and her family with education and resources, the project not only improved her health but also set the stage for a brighter future filled with possibilities.

SUCCESS STORY



VIYANSI'S TRANSFORMATION: FROM ISOLATION TO NOURISHMENT

At just 3.5 years old, Viyansi faced the harsh realities of poverty, spending her days in the fields with her parents, who worked as farm laborers. This lack of childcare made early education seem unattainable. Regular visits from an Anganwadi worker offered hope, encouraging Viyansi's enrollment in the Anganwadi program, which promised a safe space for learning and nutritious meals.

However, Viyansi's parents were hesitant, fearing that each missed workday would mean less food for the family. Left alone at home, Viyansi became increasingly withdrawn, suffering from malnutrition due to her lack of access to balanced meals.

PROJECT INTERVENTION

Dedicated project staff conducted home visits to emphasize the importance of the Anganwadi program. After persistent efforts, Viyansi's parents agreed to send her to the Anganwadi for short periods while they worked. The intervention included:

- **Health Monitoring:** Regular weight and height checks ensured her growth and development were on track.
- **Nutritional Support:** Twice-daily breakfasts and Take Home Rations provided essential nutrients.
- **Engaging Activities:** Fun learning through games, songs, and arts nurtured her creativity and social skills.

IMPACT AND POSITIVE OUTCOMES

Viyansi's transformation was remarkable:

- **Regular Attendance:** Her consistent presence at the Anganwadi fostered stability and a sense of belonging.
- **Enhanced Learning:** Participation in activities stimulated cognitive development, preparing her for future schooling.
- **Social Growth:** Viyansi overcame her initial shyness, actively engaging with peers and building friendships.

After the intervention, Viyansi's weight improved from 12.5 kg to 13.6 kg, highlighting the positive impact of the program on her health and well-being.

CONCLUSION

Viyansi's story exemplifies the transformative potential of the Health and Nutrition Project. Through dedicated efforts, the project created a nurturing environment for her growth, showing how such initiatives can positively impact vulnerable children and their families.



SUCCESS STORY



EMPOWERING LEARNING

CHALLENGE:

All three children struggled to recognize and read the Gujarati alphabet. This difficulty made them shy and embarrassed to participate in class.

INTERVENTION:

To address the issue, a dedicated learning plan was implemented, focusing on individualized and interactive methods:

- A special squad was formed for the children.
- The basics of the Gujarati alphabet were reinforced by practicing vertical and diagonal lines repeatedly.
- Alphabet recognition activities using tactile methods, like tracing letters in the sand, were incorporated.
- Picture-word association exercises helped build vocabulary and boost confidence.
- Games and activities enhanced word flow and sentence construction.
- Daily exercises with TLM (Teaching Learning Material) improved reading and writing skills.
- Leadership roles and encouragement fostered a sense of accomplishment.



OUTCOME:

Through continuous and patient efforts, all three students can now read and write the Gujarati alphabet, form simple words, and construct sentences. They actively participate in class activities and engage confidently with their peers, contributing to games and discussions.

TRANSFORMING NUMERACY SKILLS

CHALLENGE:

Hiteshbhai faced significant difficulty in identifying numerical digits. His initial attempts at counting were incorrect, hindering his ability to engage in counting-related activities.

INTERVENTION:

To support Hiteshbhai, a structured approach was implemented:

- **Number Cards:** Clear identification of numbers using question-based techniques enhanced recognition.
- **Hands-on Counting:** Activities with counters, beads, and cookies helped him practice counting accurately.
- **Sequential Arrangement:** Numbers were arranged from 1 to 10, and he practiced counting both forward and backward.
- **Practical Counting:** Exercises involving placing stones and cookies according to counted numbers reinforced his skills.

OUTCOME:

After consistent efforts, Hiteshbhai can now accurately identify numbers and perform counting activities with confidence. He can count orally and in writing up to six digits with ease. This progress highlights the effectiveness of tailored learning aids in improving his numeracy skills.

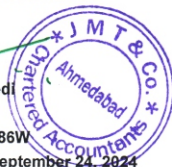

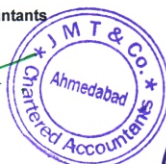

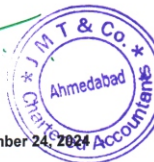
